- 1. The index is alphabetized letter by letter. Numbers and dates are filed at the end of the alphabetical sequence. All acronyms are filed in alphabetical order, not at the beginning of each letter.
- 2. Articles are indexed by title, subject, and first-named author, with cross-references from coauthors.
 3. Book reviews are indexed by the title and first-named author, with cross-references from reviewers.
- 4. All library organizations are entered under their full names.
